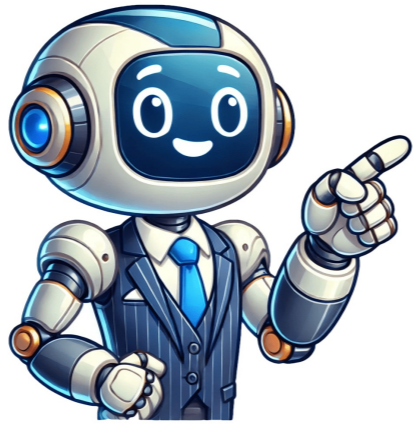


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Would you like to make a difference to the oral health of disadvantaged Australians? If you're an ADA member dentist or dental student with a passion for improving the oral health outcomes of disadvantaged groups throughout Australia, you can now apply for US\$107,500 (approx. AU\$121,386*) in funding. Grants are open for applications from Thursday 15 May to Monday 30 June. The Healthier Smiles Community Service Grants (the Grants), a joint initiative of the ADA Dental Health Foundation and Mars Wrigley Foundation, provide recipients with the funds to implement oral health community service, education, and preventative care in some of the highest risk and most in-need communities across Australia. With more than US\$1.1 million (approximately AU\$1.77 million*) already invested over a decade in oral health screening, treatment and education, the Grants are offering 10 x US\$8,450 grants (approx. AU\$13,532*) this year for registered ADA member dentists or students. The Grants have three main aims: To enable the delivery of oral health programs that provide sustained benefits screening, treatment and education for disadvantaged groups throughout Australia. To promote the work the dental community is doing to address oral health inequities faced by disadvantaged members of the Australian community; and To ensure Australia's oral health outcomes continue to improve through better access, delivery and education. Following urgent calls for a better standard of oral healthcare for older Australians stemming from the Royal Commission into Aged Care Quality and Safety and the 2023 Senate Inquiry into Access to Dental Services in Australia, the ADA has been campaigning for the Government to launch a publicly funded scheme known as the Senior Dental Benefits Schedule (SDBS). "The need for the implementation of a SDBS has been highlighted by findings from the ADA's annual study of 25,000 people revealing that in the last 12 months over half (55%) of all over 65s delayed seeking dental treatment, with affordability cited as the main reason. Additionally, nearly half (47%) of this age group reported debilitating oral issues including recent tooth or gum pain, mouth or face swelling, or a mouth infection, compared to 36% of the rest of the community. As part of a proof of concept for a SDBS, a collaborative program in partnership with Primary Dental at Maroubra Medical & Dental Centre in Sydney and the University of Sydney was launched in October 2024 and ran until March 2025. It involved 70 seniors with an active diabetes or cardiovascular disease GP care plan. Academics from the University of Sydney's Faculty of Medicine and Health have evaluated the effects of the dental treatment of the participants dental and overall health, with results showing an improvement in oral health outcomes, particularly in the management of tooth decay, gum disease, and provision of prosthodontic care. Participants also commented on the dental health education they received to help them clean and floss more, and see their dentist more often. These improved oral habits will have a beneficial knock-on effect on their chronic health condition, said ADA President Dr Chris Sanzaro. The results of the four-month pilot show that this scheme is a valuable blueprint for similar pilots to be rolled out around the country and inform the construction of a SDBS down the track. From its founding, the ADA has been committed to working towards improving the oral and general health of the Australian public. One of the main ways we try to meet that goal is staging Dental Health Week (DHW) every year, a nationwide promotional campaign that seeks to convey to people the key principles underpinning healthy teeth and gums. The focus has been on a range of issues in recent years, with attention turning this year turning to oral healthcare for children. This year's DHW will educate parents and caregivers about what they need to do to help their kids reach every 5-milestone, taking them on a journey from birth and first teeth through to first teeth and beyond. There will also be an emphasis on promoting the Child Dental Benefits Schedule, which provides care for children aged 0-17 years who are eligible for Medicare and whose parents/carer/guardian receive an eligible payment from the federal government. Finally, people will be encouraged to visit Teeth.org.au, an ADA-created and peer-reviewed site offering practical oral healthcare information across a broad range of topics. The website, dentalhealthweek.org.au is now active with the full range of DHW resources and additional oral healthcare material.

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
